
## Human Rights in Ontario

Discrimination is when someone or a group of persons is treated unfairly or unequally. This includes lack of access & inclusivity, and harassment.

The <u>Ontario Human</u>
Rights Code is the
law that protects
people from
discrimination.





The Human Rights Code protects people from discrimination based on the "grounds" of:

Place of origin Citizenship Ethnicity Sex

Disability
Family status
Marital status
Age

Receipt of public assistance

Creed (religion / beliefs)

Record of offences

Sexual orientation

Gender identity

Gender expression

On the grounds of disability, I am being discriminated against in the social area of my school facilities and access to education.

What should I



TALKING TO SCHOOL ADMIN TO ACCOMMODATE HER IS AN IMPORTANT FIRST STEP



In the following "social areas":

- Employment
- Housing (such as renting an apartment)
- Goods, services, and facilities (such as in stores, restaurants, hospitals, and police)
- Contracts (such as an agreement to buy a bicycle or a cell phone)
- Membership in a union or a professional association for your job

Employers, service providers and landlords must always accommodate you unless they can show it would cause them "undue hardship".

Undue hardship means that it would be too difficult or expensive to accommodate you.

Undue hardship is a complex legal principle.

If someone is telling you that they cannot accommodate you for this reason, you should talk to a lawyer.
